We have had numerous calls from English correspondents in the United States and from the wire services on the visit of Sir Percy Sillitoe to the United States. The press is speculating that he is going to confer with the Director and, in fact, has stated to us that he was coming to Washington to confer with the Director on the two missing foreign service officers of the British Government.

In each instance we have declined to comment even to the extent of declining comment as to whether we knew that Sir Percy was en route to Washington.

Undoubtedly if Sir Percy does get into Washington he will be contacted by the press. The Director might want to let him know of the inquiries we have been getting.

[REDACTED] advised that BURGESS had resided in Washington, D. C. with H. A. R. PHILBY, First Secretary, British Embassy, at 4100 Nebraska Avenue, N. W., and PHILBY should be able to furnish considerable information concerning BURGESS.

[REDACTED] further advised that he had learned that one [REDACTED] who arrived in this country of comparatively recent date, is well acquainted with BURGESS and had been out with BURGESS on at least one occasion here. BURGESS and [REDACTED] allegedly had known each other "from other stations" of service.

[REDACTED] also related that BURGESS had been with a certain ballet dancer or ballerina in a group of people on one occasion. [REDACTED] did not know whether BURGESS kept regular company with this woman, whose name is unknown to him. He stated he had seen her on two occasions, once at the old Balalaika Club, and knew that she formerly frequented the Troika, run by [REDACTED]. He described the blond as 5' 5"; 130 pounds; platinum hair, striking and attractive. [REDACTED] also furnished the vague information that he understood that BURGESS had associated with a group of people who spoke Russian or were studying Russian. He gathered that this was not a public class but a personal group who would have met in private homes. He knew of no place where they had met and could add nothing to the above.

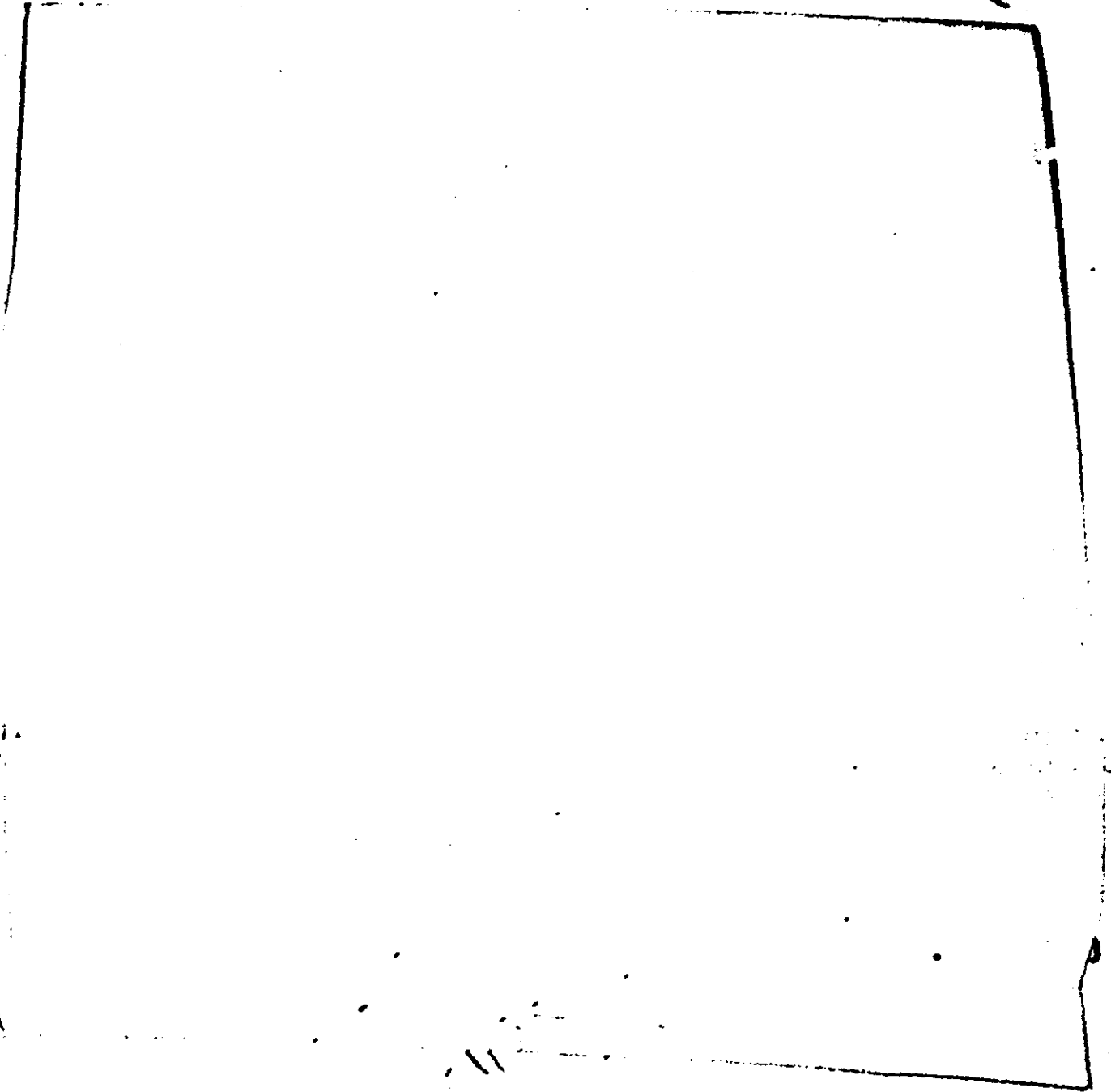

During this interview ~~MacLean~~ volunteered the observation that Malinda MacLean would have been much more the type to furnish Russia with information than MacLean, in his opinion. When asked to explain this he said he did not want it understood he thought Malinda MacLean was in any way radical or Communist, but he described her as a "social misfit" who seemed to look down upon American social life. He recalled that on many occasions at the ~~MacLean~~ farm Malinda MacLean left a party or social gathering and retired to her room, stating in effect that she was bored.

Reference is made to our memorandum of June 19, 1951, in which we set forth information obtained from [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] was re-interviewed on June 15, 1951, at which time he stated he had had a meeting with Burgess about 3:00 PM on May 25, 1951, at the Reform Club in London. At that time Burgess gave him detailed written instructions for contacting [REDACTED] to enable [REDACTED] to gain admission to some English medical school. Burgess at that time instructed [REDACTED] not to contact [REDACTED] until May 28, 1951. [REDACTED] said he thought these instructions were strange since he had originally understood Burgess would personally introduce him to [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] did not question Burgess on the reason for this change. At this same meeting with Burgess he told [REDACTED] that he was having dinner that evening with a friend who was having marital difficulties. He did not mention the friend's name, but said he was going away over the week end with this friend in order to "help this friend help himself." Burgess said he preferred not to go away with this friend.

[REDACTED] thinks that the balance of the conversation concerned the Korean war and arguments by [REDACTED] supporting General Marshall's position before the Congressional Committee investigating the dismissal of General MacArthur. Both Burgess and [REDACTED] left the Reform Club about 5:00 PM on May 25, 1951. [REDACTED] said Burgess had parked a car outside of the club. [REDACTED] stated he noticed a sign on the windshield of the car indicating it had been rented, but he did not remember from whom. Burgess told [REDACTED] he had not rented it but that it had been rented by a friend who let him use it. [REDACTED] did not know whether this was the same friend with whom Burgess was going away for the week end. [REDACTED] described the car as a small, brown British make, two or four-door sedan. [REDACTED] said Burgess drove him to a point in London where he could more easily get to the Green Park Hotel, where he was staying. This was the last contact between Burgess and [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] said he noticed no luggage in the car. However, he did observe a blue macintosh-type coat. [REDACTED] does not believe this coat belonged to Burgess.

On May 26, 1951, [REDACTED] said he received a telephone call from [REDACTED], who told him that Burgess had not come home that night. [REDACTED] advised that at the time that he was picked up by **GUY-BURGESS** in Fredericksburg, Virginia that **BURGESS** had told him that he had been stopped prior to this time by the Virginia State Police at a weighing station in Virginia a short distance from the District of Columbia-Virginia line, because of the character of his driving. **BURGESS** indicated that he had been released at this time with a warning. He told [REDACTED] that a warning had been issued to him at this time rather than an arrest made because of his diplomatic immunity.

While **BURGESS** and [REDACTED] were riding en route to Charleston, South Carolina,

BURGESS was again stopped by the Virginia State Police between Fredericksburg, Virginia and Richmond, Virginia because of the reckless character of his driving. [REDACTED], who was present at the time, noted that there was some discussion between BURGESS and the Virginia State Police officer who stopped BURGESS relative to whether or not BURGESS could be arrested because of his diplomatic status. BURGESS successfully contended that as a diplomat he was immune from arrest. The State Police officer advised BURGESS that while this was, in all probability, true, that BURGESS could be denied the right to drive his car in Virginia and that his car could be held pending the arrival of another driver. After a brief discussion with the Virginia State Police officer, BURGESS was issued another warning and proceeded on his way. (S)

[REDACTED] recalled that at this time that he was in the custody of the Virginia State Police and while BURGESS had returned to Petersburg, Virginia for the purpose of cashing a check to pay his fine, that the Virginia State Police had prepared a summary statement relative to BURGESS' driving activities. This typewritten summary statement consisted of information that the Virginia State Police had received from both BURGESS and [REDACTED]. (S)

The Virginia State Police on the completion of this typewritten summary statement, asked [REDACTED] if he would be willing to assist them to prevent BURGESS from driving a car on the highways of the State of Virginia and possibly to have BURGESS recalled to Great Britain. [REDACTED] acquiesced and the Virginia State Police officers then presented [REDACTED] with the typewritten copy of the summary statement and indicated to him that if he was willing to assist them that he should sign his name to this statement. [REDACTED] said that he merely glanced at the statement for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not the statement was against his interest without reading the statement in detail. In as much as the cursory examination of the statement indicated that it was completely against BURGESS' interests and in no way against his own, he signed the statement. This signature was in the presence of the Virginia State Police officers and not before any Justice of the Peace, judge or Notary Public. [REDACTED] indicated that at no time was he placed under oath. (S)

[REDACTED] said that he did not at any time give the Virginia State Police any information as to the length of time that he and BURGESS had been acquainted. As nearly as he can recall, this fact was furnished to the Virginia State Police by BURGESS himself. (S)

At the time of the interview, [REDACTED] said that he wished to make it clear that the facts that he had given in his signed statement of June 13, 1951 relative to his acquaintanceship with GUY BURGESS and other facts in this case were true and accurate. I, [REDACTED], make the following statement to [REDACTED] who has identified himself to me as a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. I make this statement freely. I have received no threats or promises. I am aware that this statement may be used in a court of law.

The statement that I am now making amplifies the the signed statement that I originally made to [REDACTED] on June 13, 1951.

I recall that at the time that GUY BURGESS picked me up at Fredericksburg, Va. he told me that he had been stopped enroute by the Virginia State Police at a weighing station a short distance from the District of Columbia Line because of his driving. He indicated that he was released at this time with a warning. He was issued the warning rather than being arrested because of his Diplomatic immunity. While I was riding with BURGESS he was again stopped by the Virginia State Police between Fredericksburg Va. and Richmond, Va because of the reckless character of his driving. At this time there was some discussion between Burgess and the Virginia/Police Officer [REDACTED] at which time Burgess contended that he could not be arrested because of his diplomatic status. The State Police Officer advised Burgess that while this probably was true that Burgess could be denied the right to drive his car in Virginia and his car could be held pending the arrival of another driver. Burgess was again released with a warning.

In two letters written by Burgess to [redacted] around August 15, 1950, and September 22, 1950, Burgess indicated that he had been to a social affair with [redacted] of the British Embassy, and had been on a week-end tour in Virginia in August or September, 1950, with the [redacted], whom Burgess described as one of his oldest London friends. You will note that this is undoubtedly [redacted], previously mentioned by [redacted].

Burgess also had met [redacted] and [redacted]. Burgess had advised [redacted] that he had had an argument with [redacted] over United States policies toward Spain.

[redacted], who was formerly a student at Citadel College, has advised that Burgess lectured at an International Relations Conference at Citadel College about three months ago. [redacted] assisted a Mr. Williams of the United States Department of State, Albert Pequant, of the French Embassy, Professor Paul Clyde, of Duke University, and Professor Whitten, of Princeton University, also spoke at the conference. [redacted] stated that the day after hearing of the disappearance of Burgess over the radio he had mentioned Burgess' disappearance to a group of fellow students at Citadel College. One remarked that another student, [redacted], had said that he had seen Burgess in Charleston a few days before. [redacted] also stated that another student at Citadel College, [redacted], is personally acquainted with Burgess and showed him around Charleston when Burgess attended the International Relations Conference. We intend to interview both [redacted] and [redacted] to develop this matter further.

has advised that Burgess' appearance before the International Relations Club was arranged by [redacted] and by [redacted]. Burgess appeared as a representative of the British Embassy and delivered an address relating to India. [redacted] stated he was unimpressed with Burgess and believed that Burgess had prepared sometime previous and was of a "stock" character as had been [redacted].

It has been determined that during April, 1951, Burgess and his mother, Mrs. Eva Bassett, stayed at the Ft. Sumter Hotel in Charleston, South Carolina. [redacted]

On April 13, 1951, Burgess sent a telegram to Mr. Philby, 4100 Nebraska Avenue, Washington, D. C., advising that he would be returning to Washington on April 14th with his mother. In this telegram he stated "Lincoln arriving independently."

We have a previous report that a student by the name of [redacted] had reportedly seen Burgess in Charleston after the news of his disappearance had been announced. [redacted] was interviewed and said he had conversed with Burgess at the time of Burgess' speech at the Citadel College. He said he had not seen Burgess in Charleston after the announcement of his disappearance. He believes that his remarks in discussing Burgess after his disappearance must have been misinterpreted. Another student, [redacted] W. [redacted] has advised that he first met Burgess on March 1, 1951, when Burgess was at the International Relations Club conference at the Citadel College. After the banquet at the College, [redacted] drove with Burgess in Burgess' car from the Citadel College to downtown Charleston to direct Burgess to the Francis Marion Hotel. During April, 1951, Burgess returned to the Citadel College and [redacted] was one of the students who [redacted] Professor Kline to hear a lecture on Russia. Burgess attended the lecture and [redacted]

[REDACTED]

offered various comments in connection with the lecture, but did not make any remarks which were interpreted by [REDACTED] as being pro-Russian or pro-Communist. [REDACTED] did observe that Burgess appeared to drink to excess.

[REDACTED]

was interviewed on June 18, 1951. He stated he did not know Maclean. He met Burgess socially approximately two years ago in London and had a slight acquaintanceship with him since that time. He believed Burgess' closest friend was probably [REDACTED].

[REDACTED] said that on the last week end before Burgess' disappearance Burgess was visiting the home of [REDACTED].

On the Sunday of that week end [REDACTED] invited both [REDACTED] and Burgess to supper at his home. After the disappearance, [REDACTED]' wife advised him that Burgess, during the evening of the supper, told her he was "hoping to make a Mediterranean cruise" but did not give her any further details. [REDACTED] had no reason to believe that Burgess was sympathetic to Communists or to Russia.

[REDACTED] a British citizen [REDACTED], whose telephone on Long Island was called by Burgess, has been interviewed. [REDACTED] said that he was not acquainted with Burgess but that he and his wife were long-time friends of [REDACTED] of the British Embassy. On several occasions when [REDACTED] visited [REDACTED] she was driven to New York City by Burgess. In a recent letter from [REDACTED] to [REDACTED], it was stated that [REDACTED] had no idea of the present location of Burgess and could not believe that he would go over to the Communists.

Your attention is directed to an article in the London "Daily Express" of June 14, 1951, in which an interview is set forth with Wysten Hugh Auden on June 12, 1951, at 14 Via Santa Lucia, Ischia, Italy. In this interview Auden reportedly said that Guy Burgess was a Communist and was a friend of Alan Nunn May. Auden is also quoted as saying that while at the British Embassy in Washington, D. C. Burgess was still pro-Communist. It was also set forth that according to Auden, Burgess had tried to contact him on May 25, 1951, while Auden was staying with Stephen Spender at St. John's Wood, London. It would appear from the foregoing that Auden may have considerable information of interest concerning Burgess and we would like to know the basis of his statement that Burgess was still pro-Communist while attached to the British Embassy in Washington, D. C.

MacLean and Burgess disappeared after allegedly planning to make only a week end trip to St. Malo, France. They left England on May 25, 1951, and the only trace of their whereabouts since then, according to British sources, is that they traveled by taxicab to Rennes, France, on May 26, 1951. Wires were received by MacLean's mother and by his wife, allegedly from MacLean, these two wires being delivered for transmittal at a post office in Paris, France, on June 6, 1951. A wire was received by Burgess' mother which had been delivered to a post office in Rome, Italy, on June 7, 1951. Investigation has reportedly disclosed that the handwriting on these wires was not that of MacLean or Burgess.

Information developed by investigation both in the United States and abroad reflects these men were homosexuals. Guy Burgess, while in the United States, was well known as a homosexual to his associates.

Donald Duart MacLean was born May 25, 1913, in England. He is the son of the late Liberal Party leader, Sir Donald MacLean. Donald Duart MacLean entered the British Foreign Service on October 11, 1935, serving in the British Foreign Office in London until September 24, 1938. He was then attached to the British Embassy in Paris until June 18, 1940. He thereafter remained in the Foreign Office in London until May 1, 1944, at which time he was transferred to serve in the British Embassy in Washington, D. C. He remained in Washington until September 1, 1948. Thereafter he served from November 6, 1948, until May, 1950, in the British Embassy in Cairo, Egypt. After allegedly recovering from a breakdown in Cairo he served from October, 1950, until his disappearance on May 25, 1951, with the Foreign Office in London, as the head of the American Department.

With respect to his breakdown in Cairo, Egypt, it has been reported that from about January, 1950, until May, 1950, MacLean was drinking heavily in company with a journalist, [REDACTED]. In May, 1950, the two men broke into the apartment of two American girls in Cairo and this resulted in MacLean being recalled to London. In London he was under the care of a woman psychiatrist of German origin. [REDACTED]

[REDACTED]. MacLean was married to Melinda Harling MacLean. She was born July 25, 1916, in the United States and she married Donald Duart MacLean on June 16, 1940, in Paris. She and her mother, Mrs. Melinda Dunbar, are presently in England.


Guy Francis De Wency Burgess was born April 16, 1911, in England. He attended Cambridge University, reportedly being a Communist while there. From 1934 to 1935 he lectured in history at Trinity College, Cambridge, England. From 1935 to 1938 he was with the British Broadcasting Company engaged in anti-Nazi propaganda work. From 1939 to 1941 he was employed by the British Intelligence organization, [REDACTED]. From 1941 to 1944 he was again with the British Broadcasting Company. From 1944 to 1948 he had a temporary appointment in the News Department of the Foreign Office in London and was thereafter employed in the private office of the Minister of State, Hector MacNeill, until 1948. He then worked from 1948 to 1950 in the Far Eastern

Department of the Foreign Office, and in August, 1950, was transferred to the British Embassy in Washington, D. C. in the Far Eastern Affairs Department. He left the United States on transfer back to England on May 1, 1951. After his return he was called before a board and informed that all chances for further promotion in the British Foreign Service were over. This is reportedly tantamount to dismissal procedure. Burgess' recall from the United States grew out of a letter dated March 14, 1951, from Governor Battle of Virginia to [REDACTED], the Chief of Protocol of the State Department. In this letter Governor Battle called attention to the fact that during March, 1951, Guy Burgess and an individual by the name of [REDACTED] had been arrested and brought before Judge Binford on a charge of reckless driving. Burgess claimed diplomatic immunity for himself and the driver, reportedly even going so far as to threaten the arresting officer in the event the case was prosecuted. The individual with whom Burgess was traveling, [REDACTED], has been interviewed. He advised that Burgess picked him up while he was hitchhiking to Jacksonville, Florida, and during the time they were driving through the State of Virginia they were stopped three times for driving at excessive speeds. [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] He stated that Burgess took him as far as Charleston, South Carolina, the two men spending the night in a tourist court some 60 miles north of Charleston. [REDACTED]



With respect to Burgess' access to information of a political nature, it has been reported to be of a much lower grade than the information to which MacLean had access. During the period that he was the secretary to the Minister of State, Hector Mackell, he would, of course, have had access to important information. During the period he was in Washington, D. C. he reportedly was not given important duties in the Far Eastern Affairs Department.

Reference is made to my letter to [REDACTED] dated June 19, 1951, and your letter in reply dated June 25, 1951. Your letter was of considerable interest and contained valuable data not previously known to us.

You will be interested in the fact that H. A. E. Philby is reported to have stated in an interview after his return to England that his opinions were "fairly far to the left" in 1934 when he was a resident in Vienna, Austria. Philby denied he was ever a Communist.

[REDACTED] in an interview has advised that he met Guy Burgess in approximately September, 1950, when both were staying in the apartment of [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] later [REDACTED] met Burgess in Washington, D. C. [REDACTED] while in Washington, was introduced by Burgess to [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] stated that Burgess and [REDACTED] appeared to be quite good friends.

During the past [REDACTED] in Washington, Burgess drove him to [REDACTED] Maryland, [REDACTED]. During this trip Burgess expressed a love of life in the Middle East, especially the Mohammedan countries, where he

said men are dominant and women are in the background. He further expressed the opinion that the Western World is very muddled up and said he would like to get away from it. Burgess reportedly stated that the things he had hoped for in the way of peace and generally improved world conditions had not come to pass.

With respect to [REDACTED] [REDACTED] has stated that Burgess was very friendly with [REDACTED]. She said the two men had known each other in London and that [REDACTED] is a homosexual.

We will continue to keep you advised of pertinent developments in this case and would like to receive further information developed by you.

[REDACTED] advised GUY BURGESS visited them in Pennsylvania in June or July, 1950, and October, 1950. BURGESS and mother, EVE BASSETT, visited [REDACTED] at Gippy Plantation in South Carolina 4/5-8/51. BURGESS described as brilliant, very nervous, emotionally unstable, and heavy drinker. BURGESS defended British China policy to [REDACTED] and indicated he was member of Labor Party and in favor of British Socialism. BURGESS wrote [REDACTED] shortly before sailing for England, promised to write later, adding, "I'll put some politics in it too. I'm v. (very) depressed." JOHN R. BASSETT, BURGESS' stepfather in London, by letter of 5/23/51 advised [REDACTED] that BURGESS had arrived in London shortly before 5/12/51 but had been out of London most of time since and that BURGESS' future was uncertain because he wanted to serve only in London. BURGESS wrote [REDACTED] in August and September, 1950, indicating he had been in contact in Washington with her niece [REDACTED], [REDACTED] and [REDACTED], and [REDACTED] of British Embassy. BURGESS reported to have been in Charleston, S. C., in March, 1951, to make speech at The Citadel. [REDACTED] learned that during this visit, BURGESS drank to excess and made himself generally unpopular. [REDACTED] of Phila. met BURGESS at [REDACTED] on 4/5/51 and found him bright-minded and well informed but captivated by crackpot economic ideas. [REDACTED] and his wife, [REDACTED] were jointly interviewed on June 12, 1951, [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] About 1930, when the [REDACTED] were visiting London, they called on Colonel BASSETT and met his wife and stepson, GUY BURGESS, who was still in his teens at the time.

About June, 1950, [REDACTED] stated that she received a letter from Colonel BASSETT, now retired and living at 14 Arlington House, Arlington Street, London S. W. 1, in which letter BASSETT informed her that his stepson, GUY, of the British Foreign Office, was soon to leave for assignment in the British Embassy in Washington, and that he, BASSETT, would appreciate any courtesies the [REDACTED] might extend to him.

Not long after receiving this letter, [REDACTED] wrote GUY BURGESS at the British Embassy in Washington and invited him to visit them. Shortly after writing BURGESS, [REDACTED] received a telephone call from him in Washington accepting her invitation. BURGESS came to [REDACTED] for a three or four day visit sometime in June or July, 1950, according to the [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] stated that after this visit he was obliged to send BURGESS a number of pieces of personal property which BURGESS had

negligently failed to pack when he left [REDACTED] after this visit. [REDACTED] expressed his opinion, based on this experience, that BURGESS was very careless and thoughtless about his methods of life.

During BURGESS' visit to [REDACTED] on the above occasion, [REDACTED] advised he talked with BURGESS regarding international affairs, including the British China policy. [REDACTED] advised that BURGESS was well versed on this question and skillfully presented the British Government's thesis that it was wiser to recognize Communist China and foster relations between China and Great Britain than to refuse to recognize her and force China into closer rapprochement with the USSR. [REDACTED] recalled that BURGESS impressed him as a staunch defender of British Socialism and that is his recollection that BURGESS told him he was a member of the Labor Party in Great Britain.

After BURGESS' first visit, [REDACTED] received two undated, handwritten letters from him in Washington, D. C. These letters are quoted below in their entirety since portions of them may possibly be of significance in the course of this investigation.

Envelope postmarked Washington, D. C., 7:30 PM, Aug. 15, 1950, addressed to [REDACTED] Pa.," from "G. BURGESS, British Embassy, Washington, D. C."

"British Embassy

"Dear [REDACTED]

"I have just finished writing my mother a letter (which she will of course show to Jack) telling her about my visit to [REDACTED]s. It wld. be much easier if private correspondence cld. adopt the technique of official correspondence - because then you wld. have a copy of my letter to her & wld. see for yourself how very much I enjoyed it & how very grateful I am. As it is I shall have to try & convince you - & I can't write skillfully enough to express what an impressive place in the sense of expressing in detail a way of life I found the [REDACTED] to be, quite apart from the sheer loveliness of the sticks and stones, the box & the vistas - they being only the material out of which you and your husband seem to me to have the other & bigger thing. I really did enjoy it and also meeting your friends & members of your family - who of course also fitted in & helped to make it.

"I have had your letter to [REDACTED] sent on. I understand that tho he has definitely left the Embassy he may still be in the U. S. A. (on the West Coast) - however the Netherlands Embassy will get it to him.

"I am also sending your letter to [REDACTED] which you kindly gave me & asking him to ring me.

"Very stupidly I must have misunderstood your maid having put my things in & didn't look around the room. The result is I have I think left behind a pair of striped sort of seersucker blue & white summer trousers, a white Tuxedo (coat only) a white hair brush & possibly something else. If they could be sent on to the Embassy I should be most grateful as well as apologetic for being careless.

"I gave your love to [REDACTED] with whom incidentally I am going to a party this evening & he told me how kind you had been to him in S. Carolina. I told him I knew this from my experiences in Pennsylvania & I do hope very much to see you both again.

"I trust you received my telegram. The reasons you did not receive the earlier letter that I shld. have written are too numerous to trouble you with, so I hope you will take as sufficient about half or less of my apologies. The reasons included:

"(1) I had deferred writing to you until I had met your cousin [REDACTED]. And he, laudably & intelligibly, kept on deferring meeting me, from day to day, until [REDACTED] was out of the way & [REDACTED] was O. K. It was, in fact, well worth waiting to meet yr. cousin since I thought he was even nicer than you had told me. And his wife, who I met separately, is certainly as beautiful and attractive as I had heard from you that she was.

"(2) I now have a motorcar & I wanted to tell you what I thought of the weekend tour I made with the [REDACTED] here (who is one of my oldest London friends) of our Jefferson architecture & Virginia. It is easy to do so since I thought quite simply that Monticello was one of the most civilized & beautiful houses I had ever seen & the most c. & b. anyone had ever built for himself. About the University of Virginia it is hard to speak unless one falls back on merely saying it is a triumph. Or, more important, worthy of the man that one hour in Monticello had made me love. [REDACTED] capacity was only, it seemed to me, exceeded by his taste. It particularly struck me (as a detail only) that he achieved regularity without repetition. (The cinymetry of the 2 main sides of the campus.)

"I f you wld. like me to come & see you & yr. husband I wld. v. much like to & I now have a good car. So it only needs me being told where. And, I suppose, when. I find yr. countrymen v. nice to mine, & to me.

"I have no possible apology for not having reported that what I foolishly left behind had arrived, & for not thanking you for the care & trouble that you were clearly put to.

as a keen, young British diplomat who was interesting and stimulating. They advised that BURGESS appeared to be emotionally unstable, being gay and exhilarated at times, quarrelsome, worried, and distracted at others.

[REDACTED] stated that BURGESS was a very nervous individual who chain-smoked cigarettes almost continuously during his visit to [REDACTED] in the summer of 1950 and October of that year. [REDACTED] advised that he did not see BURGESS after the October, 1950, visit.

[REDACTED] advised that around February or March, 1951, BURGESS informed her, either over the telephone or in a letter which is no longer available, that he was scheduled to visit Charleston, S. C., soon for the purpose of making a speech at The Citadel Military Academy. BURGESS asked [REDACTED] to write him letters of introduction to several of her friends in that area. In compliance with his request, [REDACTED] wrote letters to [REDACTED], [REDACTED], and [REDACTED].

[REDACTED] stated that they subsequently got word from [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] that BURGESS had conducted himself very badly in Charleston in March, 1951. [REDACTED] learned that BURGESS had gone to Charleston for the primary purpose of attending a dinner and making a speech at The Citadel. These sources reported to the [REDACTED] that BURGESS had drunk to excess during his entire stay in Charleston and had, in fact, arrived at the dinner at The Citadel in an intoxicated condition. At this affair, according to the information received by the [REDACTED], BURGESS made a highly contentious and unpopular speech which resulted in a serious argument between him and [REDACTED].

Other reports reaching the [REDACTED] from [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] in Charleston were to the effect that in addition to drinking excessively, BURGESS had numerous flareups of temper in their presence and was generally disliked because of his surly attitude.

[REDACTED] advised that while she was staying at [REDACTED] S. C., in April, 1951, she received a letter from BURGESS to the effect that his mother was in the United States and that he intended to take a motoring trip to the South and would be going to South Carolina. BURGESS wondered if he could drop in with his mother for a visit at [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] advised

that she already had house guests scheduled for the time BURGESS intended to visit [REDACTED], and, accordingly, wrote him to this effect. He apparently did not get this letter in time, and, according to [REDACTED], on the night of April 5, 1951, BURGESS and his mother arrived at [REDACTED] after considerable delay due to a car breakdown. Because [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were already guests in the [REDACTED] house, there was room only for EVE BASSETT on the night of April 5, 1951. BURGESS spent that night in a motel near Moficks Corner and moved into [REDACTED] the following morning.

[REDACTED] said that EVE BASSETT and her son, GUY BURGESS, remained at [REDACTED] until Sunday, April 8, 1951, when they moved to the Fort Sumter Hotel in Charleston. [REDACTED] stated that BURGESS and his mother spent several days at the Fort Sumter Hotel waiting for their automobile to be repaired. [REDACTED] was not at [REDACTED] at the time BURGESS visited there in April, 1951.

[REDACTED] stated that BURGESS appeared to be deeply mortified because of his misconduct at the time of his previous visit to Charleston and, because of this or possibly the presence of his mother, he was exceedingly judicious in his drinking during the time he was at [REDACTED]. In this connection, [REDACTED] stated that Mrs. BASSETT told her GUY had suffered concussion of the brain when he fell down the stairs at the Foreign Office in London about three years ago, and for this reason, Mrs. BASSETT said that GUY should never drink potent beverages.

[REDACTED] said that on the occasion of BURGESS' visit to [REDACTED], the last time she saw him, he appeared to be calm and serene, was cheerful, looked well, and exhibited no signs of tension. He told her that he had applied to the Foreign Office for release from his present assignment because, as he put it, he felt he could be of greater value in the Foreign Office at London.

[REDACTED] advised that BURGESS telephoned her from Washington the day before he sailed to say goodbye. This was at the end of April or beginning of May, 1951. In his telephone conversation, according to [REDACTED], BURGESS sounded as though he were in good spirits and promised to write her a long letter as soon as he arrived in London. [REDACTED] advised that EVE BASSETT returned to England by air.

On June 15, 1951, [REDACTED] made available a third undated, handwritten letter from BURGESS to [REDACTED] which is quoted below. This letter was found by [REDACTED] after the June 12, 1951, interview in a package of letters to be answered. The letter was received by her at the end of April or beginning of May, 1951, a few days after BURGESS telephoned to say goodbye. The envelope is not available.

"Dear [REDACTED]

"Just a short note following our telephone conversation to return you your cheque. I hate having to borrow money in unforeseen & unforeseeable emergencies even from good friends & was very glad I was able to avoid cashing it. However if you had not had the kindness to provide it I wld. have been very worried, being with my mother & Fort Sumter being as expensive as it was. With it there were no worries and we had a truly wonderful time and indeed from our point of view tho not yours I fear the car breakdown was a blessing in disguise. It enabled us to spend a whole week (by forcing us) in Charleston & getting to know it a little. Even a week was far too short. I think & hope we quite (?) things with the [REDACTED] & [REDACTED] & the S [REDACTED] story you had heard was, I wasn't in the Citadel, and as I told you, an interested (but not interesting) invention.

"As I told you on the phone I'm so pressed with packing etc. plus my mother that I wld. prefer to write you a proper letter of thanks later. I'll put some politics in too. I'm v. depressed. Meanwhile very (?).

"P.S. It was your fault, my mothers fault or my fault, that we did not get your letter till after our return and we did get your postcard. However I hope like Charleston thats all understood now & cleared up."

██████████ advised that they were shocked to read in the press about the disappearance of GUY BURGESS and DONALD MacLEAN. They said that they had never heard BURGESS mention MacLEAN, and they did not know the latter. They stated that BURGESS impressed them as being a rather weak character but had not the slightest intimation that he harbored disloyal opinions or was engaged in any subversive enterprise directed by Moscow. They advised that BURGESS' mother and stepfather are very conservative and did not share his liberal political views.

██████████ exhibited a letter dated May 23, 1951, which she had received from Colonel JOHN BASSETT in London. In this letter BASSETT advised that GUY BURGESS had arrived in England aboard the Queen Mary shortly before May 12, 1951, and that "he has been out of London most of the time since." BASSETT also commented as follows concerning BURGESS: "His future is undecided at present. It seems he can't bear to serve anywhere but London but how far the Foreign Office is likely to come into line with his views remains to be seen. Most of their men, I gather, are tumbling over each other to get overseas, so perhaps he will get what he wants!"

The ██████████ advised that no further word has been heard from GUY BURGESS or the BASSETTS, but they promised to promptly notify the FBI if they receive any information concerning this matter. They indicated that they do not at this time contemplate further correspondence with the BASSETTS.

At Philadelphia, Pa.

██████████ advised on June 13, 1951, that he was at ██████████ when GUY BURGESS and his mother arrived on April 5, 1951. ██████████ stated that he had an opportunity to talk with BURGESS at some length on the morning of April 6, 1951, prior to the time ██████████ and his son-in-law and daughter, ██████████, left the plantation to return to Philadelphia.

██████████ described BURGESS as a bright minded and well informed man who appeared younger than his years. ██████████ stated that BURGESS revealed during their conversation that he was captivated by "a fine assortment of crackpot economic ideas, such as those advanced by the late British economist, Professor KEYNES, holding that a country can

spend itself to prosperity by unlimited borrowing." In this connection, [REDACTED] advised that BURGESS expressed considerable enthusiasm over a biography of Professor KEYNES recently published in London by a friend of BURGESS. [REDACTED] said BURGESS lent him this book but [REDACTED] sent it back to BURGESS at the British Embassy with the comment that it was too deep for him.

[REDACTED] emphasized that nothing BURGESS did or said caused him to suspect BURGESS' loyalty to his own government.

[REDACTED] advised on June 13, 1951, that he met BURGESS and his mother on April 5, 1951, at [REDACTED] and spoke briefly with BURGESS the following morning. [REDACTED] advised that he considered BURGESS intelligent but something of a smart aleck" or "know-it-all." [REDACTED] said that he noticed, however, that BURGESS was making every effort to be pleasant. [REDACTED] stated that he found BURGESS to be far above average as a conversationalist. He said that BURGESS talked learnedly about literature and was well up on the current developments in the search for the Boswell papers.

RE: DONALD DUART MACLEAN

At Gwynedd, Pa.

On June 16, 1951, [REDACTED], a retired Foreign Service Officer, advised that he was on the Egyptian Desk at the Department from 1946 to June, 1949. He stated that he cannot recall ever having heard of DONALD MacLEAN during this period.

[REDACTED] advised that [REDACTED] ON [REDACTED], and [REDACTED] were probably in the American Embassy at Cairo, Egypt, during the time MacLEAN was assigned to the British Embassy there, and may know something about him. [REDACTED]

At Mt. Pocono, Pa.

[REDACTED] was interviewed on June 23, 1951, at [REDACTED]

[REDACTED], Mt. Pocono, Pa., by SA [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] stated that he was in Cairo from November, 1945, to August, 1950, and recalls that DONALD B. MacLEAN was there from approximately 1948 to early 1950. According to [REDACTED], DONALD MacLEAN was Counselor of the British Embassy and was relieved of duty in Cairo because of the following incident.

[REDACTED] presently employed at the American Embassy in Moscow, USSR, was [REDACTED] secretary in Cairo. She commenced work in February, 1948. [REDACTED] shared an apartment in Cairo with an unknown English girl. Later, this English girl left and [REDACTED] who also worked in the American Embassy in Cairo, moved in with [REDACTED]. One night while drunk, MacLEAN and [REDACTED], [REDACTED], were caught breaking into the [REDACTED] apartment. [REDACTED] was absent from the apartment, and [REDACTED] who was asleep in the bedroom, denied hearing any commotion. However, according to [REDACTED] from the condition of the room, it was apparent that MacLEAN and [REDACTED] had caused much commotion. [REDACTED] was of the opinion that [REDACTED] was looking for the British girl who formerly shared the apartment with [REDACTED].

[REDACTED] stated that MacLEAN, while in Cairo, associated with a fast group which centered its attention around the King of Egypt's sister, Princess Faiza. [REDACTED] described this group as not particularly immoral, but merely fun-loving.

[REDACTED] MacLEAN was personally criticized by the newspaper for having associated with [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] said that he approached MacLEAN regarding the newspaper criticism and MacLEAN denied that [REDACTED] was a Communist. [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] advised that if MacLEAN had any subversive friends, he, [REDACTED], was not acquainted with them. He said that he considered MacLEAN an intelligent, hard working, conscientious Englishman, and that he is unable to rationalize recent publicity regarding MacLEAN's possible affiliations with Moscow.

Reference is made to our memorandum to you dated June 10, 1961, in which we stated that we intended to interview [redacted].

[redacted] was interviewed on June 10, 1961.

He advised that he met Burgess in the late 1930's when Burgess was employed by the British Broadcasting Company in London. He saw Burgess frequently in 1940 at the Cafe Royale and at parties.

[redacted] did not see Burgess again until his return to London in 1947. He characterized Burgess as a very heavy drinker, an emotional person and very likely a homosexual. He said that he had no knowledge of espionage activities or Communist Party sympathies on the part of Burgess, recalling only that Burgess was quite warmly in favor of Republicans again in the period 1938 to 1939.

[redacted] recounted that he believed that this was in conformity with the accepted British opinion at that time. He said that he had never corresponded with Burgess and did not consider him to be a particularly close friend. He described Burgess as a "pusher" and an intensely ambitious person and one who took great satisfaction in being close to the great and near-great in the British foreign service.

[redacted] furnished the names of the following persons whom he believed knew Burgess:

[redacted] recalled that Burgess collaborated with [redacted] in the publication of a financial paper in London. Another acquaintance of Burgess was [redacted], who was described as an advertising man and the closest associate of Burgess known to [redacted]. He also mentioned that [redacted] knew Burgess well.

In two letters written by Burgess to [redacted] around August 15, 1950, and September 22, 1950, Burgess indicated that he had been to a social affair with [redacted] of the British Embassy, and had been on a week-end tour in Virginia in August or September, 1950, with the [redacted], whom Burgess described as one of his oldest London friends. You will note that this is undoubtedly [redacted], previously mentioned by me to you.

Burgess also had met [redacted] and [redacted]. Burgess had advised [redacted] that he had had an argument with [redacted] over United States policies toward Spain.

[redacted], who was formerly a student at Citadel College, has advised that Burgess lectured at an International Relations Conference at Citadel College about three months ago. [redacted] stated a Mr. Williams of the United States Department of State, Albert Faquant, of the French Embassy, Professor Paul Clyde, of Duke University, and Professor Whitten, of Princeton University, also spoke at the conference. [redacted] stated that the day after hearing of the disappearance of Burgess over the radio he had mentioned Burgess' disappearance to a group of fellow students at Citadel College. One remarked that another student, [redacted], had said that he had seen Burgess in Charleston a few days before. [redacted] also stated that another student at Citadel College, [redacted] is personally acquainted with Burgess and showed him around Charleston when Burgess attended the International Relations Conference. We intend to interview both [redacted] and [redacted] to develop this matter further.

██████████ was interviewed on June 19, 1951, and stated she has no clear recollection of Guy Burgess. She stated she believed she met him through ██████████ when ██████████ was doing some propaganda broadcasts for the British Broadcasting Company during the past war. She also believed she met Burgess at parties in London, but said she "never recalled seeing him in a sober state."

██████████ She said she had no information on any pro-Soviet or pro-Communist tendencies on the part of Burgess. She said that in addition to her husband, ██████████, and ██████████, she believes Burgess would possibly be known to ██████████ and ██████████, both of whom she described as writers who are presently in London. She also believed that ██████████ or ██████████, ██████████, may have known Burgess.

It has been determined that when Burgess left the United States on the Queen Mary his cabin mates were ██████████ and ██████████. ██████████ was interviewed on June 16, 1951, at which time he advised that he did sail on the Queen Mary for England on May 1, 1951, and did share a stateroom with Guy Burgess. He said he had very little contact with Burgess and had not connected Burgess with the publicity over the missing diplomats until interviewed. He said that Burgess usually left the cabin early in the morning and returned late in the evening. He noted nothing unusual in Burgess' conduct except for some indication that Burgess was drinking heavily. He recalled that on the last day of the voyage Burgess introduced him to a man whose name he did not recall. From the description furnished by ██████████ it would appear that this individual is identical with ██████████ who has previously been interviewed and the details furnished to you.

The proprietor of the Never Closed Auto Company in New York City has advised that he replaced a voltage regulator in Burgess' Lincoln Continental

automobile on approximately November 17, 1950. Burgess at that time stated he was en route to Canada. We have also been advised by an insurance broker that on November 16, 1950, while Burgess was in New York en route to Canada, an attempt was made to steal his car while it was parked near the Sutton Hotel in New York City. We would like to be advised if you have any information which would indicate that Burgess did make a trip to Canada in November, 1950.

The "Irish Times" also reported that approximately 18 months ago Burgess visited his mother, who was in a Dublin hospital, and while in Dublin, Burgess was involved in an automobile accident and was arrested and arraigned in a Dublin court.
